

The Old Testament Prophet Jeremiah included these words from Jeremiah 29:11 in his letter to the Exiles during the Babylonian Captivity of 70 years. Daniel Kidder-McQuown has been called as the Designated Term Pastor. As he begins in February, the church will be invited to join him in his ministry of revitalizing a church like ours with his skills in helping similar churches.

In a recent conversation I had with the Rev. Dr. Charles Buck, former Hawaii Conference UCC Minister who now is President/CEO of United Church Funds, this path of calling a Designated Term Pastor for 1 Year is the current accepted practice of churches in the UCC including at the national level. As success is experienced, additional years can be added to the call.

There are three thoughts I want to leave you with:

First, whenever I see you, whenever I think of Waipahu United Church of Christ, I will always be "**Thankful.**" Your ministry as a disciple of Jesus Christ and your friendship and love for me will long be remembered. I very much "*Appreciated*" being invited to be the Interim Pastor!

Second, "Life Goes On" as each month, there will be new digitals that are pictured in this monthly Outlook newsletter depicting the worship services, work days and other events of the church. As Jeremiah wrote, God has plans for our well being, our welfare and not for our demise or our harm. So we must continue to either "pass the torch" or "receive the torch" as the ministry of Christ continues here.

Third, as we have just celebrated the season of giving and receiving gifts, let us always "**Have Hope**." In 1 Corinthians 13:13 where the Apostle Paul spoke of the three gifts of faith, hope and love (yes, the greatest is love) remember that HOPE points us in the direction of the future. And this is what all of us are thinking and praying about, "the future of Waipahu UCC."

I hope you had a great Christmas and Holiday Season! Our Church's Christmas Eve candlelight service was simply beautiful! We had 60 worshippers in attendance, and everyone had smiles on their faces.

We had two Congregational meetings in December. One on the 1st and the last one on the 22nd. For both meetings we had a quorum, and all measures passed. Hooray!
Your Church's finances are in good shape! For eleven months ended November 30, 2024, we had expenses exceeding income by \$23,315.56. It was earlier projected that in all of 2024, expenses would exceed income by \$122,616.28. It looks like we will be significantly under this projected loss by 12/31/24. Praise God!

As we enter this New Year, we will be seeing Pastor Chris moving on in life. We wish him well in whatever undertaking is in store for him and his family. We will see our new designated Pastor, the Reverend Daniel John Kidder-McQuown, begin his journey with WUCC on February 1, 2025. We will all have to work together to make sure that this transition goes smoothly and cooperate with Pastor Dan when he calls upon us for assistance.

The Pastoral Relations Committee has added Clarence Nishihara and Heidi Pagaragan to fill open positions. Continuing on will be Yolanda and Eddie. Elmer Pagaragan has volunteered to serve on the Board of Trustees and Lynn Yamauchi has volunteered to serve as Financial Secretary, which is a position that has been open for some time. "The Twelve Days of Christmas"

Christmas day isn't the end of the celebration of the Birth of Christ. The Christian history follows what is known as the Liturgical Calendar year. There are 6 sacred celebrations that are recognized throughout the calendar year.

The 25 days of Advent is the first season then followed by Christmastime where the celebrations and activities actually begins on the 25th of December and ends on the 5th of January.

Then on the Liturgical Calendar, Epiphany begins on the 6th of January. This is to celebrate the significance of the Birth of Christ. Epiphany is a Greek word meaning "appearance" or "manifestation", the coming of the Magi from the east to see the Christ child is but one event.

Six months between Advent and Pentecost is where most festivals occurred it's the time to concentrate on the workings and the life of Christ. Then the other six months between Pentecost and Advent is the time to concentrate on the teachings and the applications of those teachings of Christ.

The Christian Liturgical Calendar will see Advent; Christmas; Epiphany; Lent; Holy Week; and Easter. For all, the most important days are the "Lord's Day", The first Sundays of the week and the first Sunday of the month for the "Lord's Supper".

"Thank you so much! I appreciate everyone at the church! Thank you for taking the time to deliver the gifts to my family and I. Jesus is the reason for the season. God is good!"

From these messages, it is evident that each contributor made a difference to these families! Your generosity helped immensely towards
